Hiring is increasingly taking place without face-to-face interviews.

Companies are saving a buck by having employees work remotely. Employees get to work in pyjamas and never need to leave their house or be with anyone. But is this really a good thing?

I think there are huge advantages to working remotely, part-time, as long as there is still some plan to be

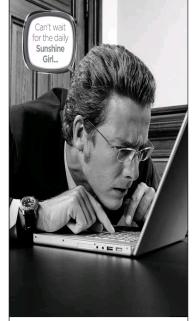
